

Collaboration and action 2020

Building on success

In November 2019, David Middleton of DMC and Jacqui Staunton of CCS again combined forces to present the fifth annual, not for profit, free to attend annual conference in the Making Places Last series, this time with an emphasis on the practical consequences of climate change and solutions to the challenge.

The event was the largest multi-sectored conference on climate change to be held in the West Midlands in 2019.

A capacity 200 delegates signed in for the event which was applauded for:

- the opportunity to network, share knowledge and exchange experience in tackling the climate crisis
- highlighting the need for collaboration >
- the line-up of speakers giving a wide range of views from multi-national companies, to micro businesses, ngos and voluntary organisations
- the lively final words and challenge to delegates of Chris Crean (FoE)
- it's greater interaction with delegates (compared to the previous four events)
- highlighting the potential of the West Midlands to be at the vanguard of the post fossil fuel, zero carbon revolution.

The 2019 event was sponsored by the RSA; Walsall Housing Group, Commercial, and the Energy Institute at the University of Birmingham. It was officially opened by Deputy Lieutenant to the West Midlands, Professor Rashid Gatrad, OBE.

A 2020 event + more?

On December 3rd, a post 2019 event review meeting agreed the 2019 event had been the best to date and to try and capitalise on that. The meeting agreed a 2020 event:

- would need to move forward from its traditional early November date so as to avoid clashing with the 2020 UN Climate Change Conference (UNFCCC COP 26) meeting in Glasgow from November 9th to 20th;
- should focus on and encourage greater collaborative action;
- should seek to bring together as many disparate organisations and projects to enable greater understanding of what action is happening across the region;
- should develop a closely related series of bi-monthly workshops used to highlight good practice; innovative solutions; action arising from the conference. These might be held alternatively in Walsall and Birmingham. A host for Birmingham events would be needed and preferably from the professional services sector;
- should seek to encourage the involvement of the 70 + businesses so far to have interfaced with the conferences;
- should try to capitalise on the 2019 involvement of the Deputy Lieutenant of the West Midlands and through the office of the Lord Lieutenant extend an invitation to HRH Prince Charles to speak at the 2020 event;
- in the event of a decline from HRH, the Rt. Hon. Claire Perry O'Neill, Chairman of COP 26 be invited;
- we also note the Commonwealth held a significant climate meeting in London last October. Is there a connection to be made to Birmingham 2022?

In this opening part of the conference we seek to understand the scale of the impact climate change is already having on people. The Commonwealth represents $1/3^{rd}$ of the world's population and many of its states are already facing the consequences of climate change. In October 2019 in London the Commonwealth launched its Common Earth project - an international consortium aimed at collectively creating and harnessing strategies to restore the damage caused by climate change and achieve the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

The involvement of the Commonwealth in our event is made especially poinent because many countries impacted by climate change will be represented in Birmingham in 2022 for the Commonwealth Games.
